

XXII OLYMPIAD OF THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE FOR STUDENTS OF TECHNICAL UNIVERSITIES

n Saturday, 24th April 2021, the Centre of Languages and Communication hosted the Final of the XXII Olympiad of the English Language for Students of Technical Universities. Every year The Poznan University of Technology acts as the host of this event. There were always hundreds of students from different universities from all over Poland, lots of sponsors and special guests taking part in the Olympiad. Unfortunately, this year due to coronavirus related restrictions each part of the Olympiad was held online, including the second stage and the finals on 23rd April and 24th April respectively. Among technical universities, whose students took part in the Final were Politechnika Poznańska, Politechnika Lubelska, Politechnika Warszawska, Politechnika Częstochowska and Politechnika Wrocławska. In the final stage, students who proved to be the best after the second stage held also online, were asked to prepare a seven-minute presentation for the given topic. It was then presented via the Internet. The presentations were shown in a Zoom meeting to jury members and organizers gathered in a lecture hall at PUT. Among participants, gathered at the lecture hall at the Poznan University of Technology were prof. dr hab. Tomasz Łodygowski, the Director of Centre of Languages and Communication, prof. dr Liliana Szczuka-Dorna, Karol Matysiak, MA, Kinga Komorowska, MA, organizing members and technical support. They all wore face masks and were sat according to the rules of social distancing. But most of the jury members assessed students' speeches online from their homes, because of covid-19 restrictions. The link to the meeting was announced well in advance and hundreds of viewers supported their competitors.

Students were invited to show their presentations on one of the following citations for this year:


"Technology is a queer thing. It brings you great gifts with one hand and it stabs you in the back with the other". (Carrie Snow)

Summary of the English Medium Instruction 2021 Conference

AT THE POZNAN UNIVERSITY OF TECHNOLOGY – 18TH AND 19TH FEBRUARY 2021

he English Medium Instruction at European Universities Conference came to an end successfully. The Conference was organized by the Centre of Languages and Communication at The Poznan University of Technology on 18th and 19th February 2021. The members of the organizing team were prof. Liliana Szczuka-Dorna, Director of Centre of Languages and Communication, Katarzyna Matuszak, PhD, Małgorzata Bączyńska, MA, Karol Matysiak, MA, Małgorzata Margraf-Adamczyk, MA, and Katarzyna Jesse, MA, who are all employees of Poznan University of Technology. The whole

Conference took place on Thursday, 18th February and Friday, 19th February. There had been guest speakers and participants from 12 countries, such as Poland, Spain, France, Germany, and the UK. On-site or online participants could have listened to 16 presentations and take part in 6 workshops. This Conference was organized in a hybrid form, with participants listening on-site and through Zoom platform online.

First, professor Liliana Szczuka-Dorna, the Director of Centre of Languages and Communication opened the Conference and welcomed the plenary speakers as well as more than one hundred participants from Poland and abroad. The English Medium Instruction at European Universities Conference was the last part of the NAWA grant entitled "Raising"

the competences of academic staff and the institution's potential in accepting people from abroad – Welcome to Poland". The Director of Centre of Languages and Communication presented a short history of the NAWA project and explained why EMI is so important in making some changes in the methodology of teaching content courses in English at technical universities. Then, professor Tomasz Łodygowski, Former Rector of Poznan University of Technology, provided participants with the history of first lectures in English at PUT and the demand for foreign languages in a multi-lingual world. He also spoke about our





international programmes in English, which are also currently available to international students.

Professor Paweł Śniatała, on behalf of Professor Teofil Jesionowski, Rector of Poznan University of Technology, officially opened the conference. Professor Teofil Jesionowski, Rector of Poznan University of Technology and Professor Tomasz Łodygowski, Rector of Poznan University of Technology in the years 2012-2020 took honorary patronage of the EMI Conference.

Then Karol Matysiak, MA, who was the Conference moderator, briefly introduced the most important information about the organization of the Conference and all additional events.

This Conference was organized in a hybrid form, with participants listening on-site and through Zoom platform online because of covid restrictions. The risk of gathering more than one hundred attendees in one lecture hall was too high. Due to that fact the organizers decided to invite only plenary speakers, who came from Poznań, or who are employed at the Poznan University of Technology. Among plenary speakers and workshop teachers were lecturers and academics from either Poland or abroad: prof. Liliana Szczuka-Dorna, Barbara Sawicka, Divya Madhavan, Stefania Cicillini, Wendy Bell, Thomas Vogel, prof. Krystyna Drozdział-Szelest, Yuan Bock, Anna Raulinaj-

tys, Anna Górska, David Tual, Katarzyna Lanucha, Izabela Cichocka, Stanislav Rychtarik, Vendula Kokoskova and Brendan Keenan on the first day of the conference. The second day of the Conference matched the presentations or workshops held by prof. Cristina Perez Guillot, Maciej Buczowski, Jeffrey Purchla, Piotr Romanowski, Eliza Ciałkowska-Gunther, Katarzyna Matuszak, Małgorzata Bączyńska, Nuala Mederski, Weronika Krzebietke, Agata Janicka, Ewelina Nowak, and Joanna Szczuka.

The presentations were displayed via Zoom meeting to organizers, who gathered in a lecture hall at the university in Poznań. All participants wore face masks and were sat according to the rules of social distancing. The link to the meeting was announced well in advance and hundreds



of viewers could watch and hear all presentations. During two days of the Conference there were really tiny technical problems and everyone was able to submit the topic of the speech to a great extent. Fortunately, in case of severe technical problems, there was IT specialists' support, including Robert Hamrol and Piotr Halt who did a great job to provide technical support of the Conference. They had also provided live media coverage of the event.

The special wrap-up to each day of the Conference was the Jazz listening session performed by the saxophonist Jan Adamczewski on Thursay 18th February. Whereas the last day of the conference was signified by the closing ceremony concert by Jan Adamczewski Trio. Just before the end of the Conference, there had been the Discussion

Forum, in which Professor Tomasz Łodygowski- Former Rector of Poznan University of Technology, Professor Liliana Szczuka-Dorna- CLC Director at Poznan University of Technology, Paweł Śniatała, Ph.D. Dsc.Eng. - Vice-Rector for International Cooperation, Professor Krystyna Droździał-Szelest, Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznań, Joanna Kałkowska D.Sc.Eng. and Marlena Kucz D.Sc.Eng. exchanged their views on the outcome of discussions as well as responded to questions of online participants.

During the sessions of the Conference, in lunch breaks "Biesiada" catering served tasty take-away lunches and dinner sets.

he team working on the EntreSTEAM project holds both our international and local meetings on a regular basis, as a course module is being developed and an English course involving transnational teamwork is being piloted.



In the photo below, you can see the course module work in progress during one of our Finnish – Spanish – Polish team meetings.


Above, there is a homepage of the course created on the University of Oulu Moodle platform where our students will be invited for the pilot phase.

Zespół Wsparcia Technicznego Technical Support Team

espół Wsparcia Technicznego (Technical Support Team) was established in September 2020 as a response to the situation caused by the pandemic. While we were forced to switch to online classes, it turned out that there might be a need for some technical support in terms of organizing the process of online education, running online classes, using certain tools for communicating with students both synchronously and asynchronously.

As a Team, we offer online trainings, as well as individual meetings with teachers. While the former are organized for a group of teachers and present online tools in a practical way showing how to use them, the latter constitute an opportunity to address a particular issue/problem one may have. A teacher posts their problem/question at our forum at E-kursy or contacts a particular member of ZWT individually.

After one semester of our work, it is clearly visible that especially one issue has emerged as a great concern

among teachers, namely, the problem of evaluating students' progress while teaching online. In the following paragraph, one tool for online testing during foreign language classes will be presented.

Real-time Quiz is a multiple-choice quiz available at Moodle. Each student receives each question at the same time with a time limit to answer it. Between each question the correct answer is displayed, along with the number of students giving each answer (and some statistics about the percentage class or individual correct answers). This allows each question to be discussed before moving on. Teachers can review the answers, once the quiz is finished, to identify any areas that need to be covered again. It is possible to add a picture to create a more attractive layout. One can use the tool for, among others, testing vocabulary (terms and definitions, gaps filling with given options, providing synonyms/antonyms etc.) and grammar (e.g. choosing the appropriate structure to fill in a gap).
